Adult Education at the new Compumachine Technology Center will offer continuing education at the facility.

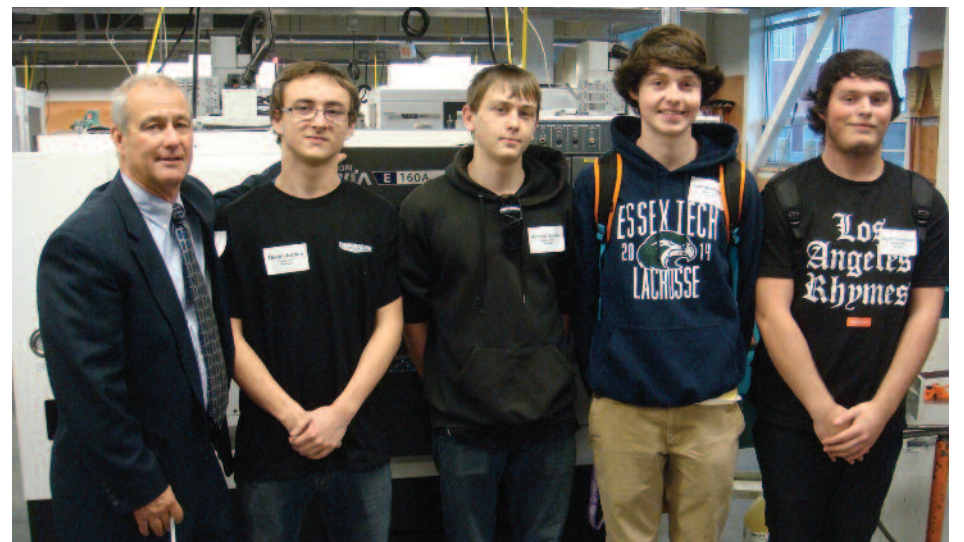

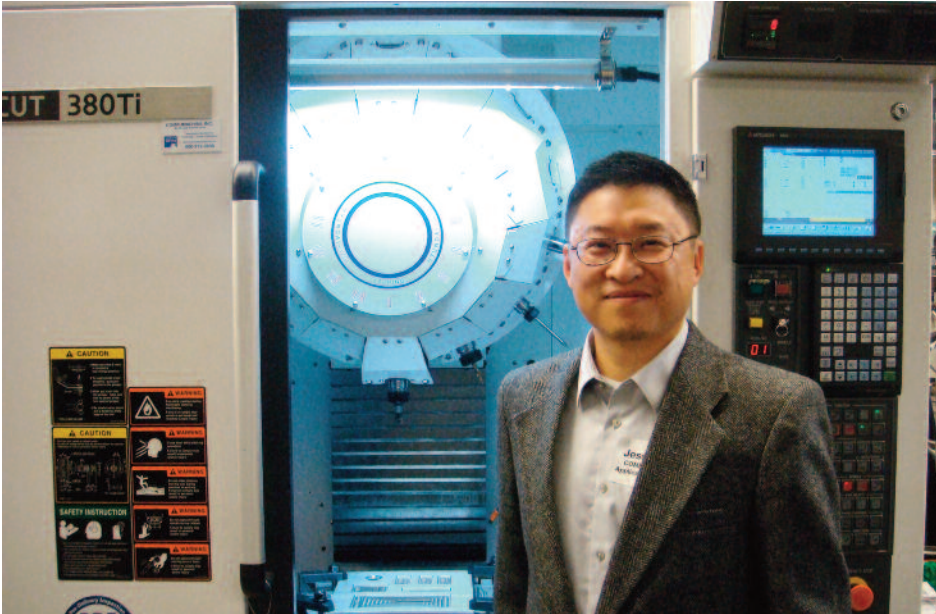
